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

A Generous Gift

We lost our long-time friend and Kirkman House supporter, **Dan Dunn** in May. Dan loved history and had a special place in his heart for our museum. His own home was decorated with Victorian furniture and artwork

and he specified that some lovely pieces would come to Kirkman House. Two elegant red velvet chairs are a welcome addition to the Music Room, as are several

marble-topped tables in the Parlor and Dining Room. Isabella has needed a washstand in her bedroom for some time and now she has a lovely one. A dramatic gift is perhaps the large roll top desk and it comes with an interesting history. "Henry Baker" is written on the tag attached to the desk's keys. The son of local legend Dr. Dorsey Baker, Henry Clay Baker was an important Walla Wallan in his own right. Henry Baker listed his profession as "capitalist" in the 1892 territorial census and one of his most ambitious ventures was the development of the Langdon Baker 600 acre apple orchard in the early 1900s. Henry's office for Baker and Baker Investments was located at the corner of Alder and 2nd and it is from that building his roll top comes. The desk should be right at home at Kirkman House Museum, as in the past we have been gifted several other Baker family pieces, including his Henry Baker's daughter Henrietta's bedroom furniture and a special velvet chair that came from the Anderson mansion and belonged to Mabel Baker Anderson, Henry's sister. William Kirkman had numerous business dealings with the Baker family and it is fitting that so many items with the Baker provenance now reside in Kirkman House.

Lunch with Isabella

Kirkmans go to the Fair

There was a steady stream of fairgoers circling Kirkman House Museum's special display in the center of the Pavilion. Mannequins in Victorian garb stood amongst display cases filled with Fair memorabilia. Posters retold the Fair's history during the Kirkman Family era with old photos and text. Carolyn created an elaborate fruit and vegetable display inspired by those created in the early 1900s. Her home canning exhibit featured a huge antique pressure cooker, antique canning jars and all the implements necessary to "put up" fruits and vegetables for the winter months. We displayed a 4ft wide 1889 bird's eye view map of Walla Walla and it attracted many visitors. Young and old alike were fascinated by the changes the map showed from 1889 until now and spent time looking for buildings on Main that still exist and tracing streets until they disappeared into farmers' fields. This is the second year Kirkman House Museum has been invited to create a special exhibit in the Pavilion and we are already looking forward to next year! Some of the exhibits will find their way into our permanent exhibit and be used for our Kids First education initiative.

Whispered Memories and Psychic Fair

Be sure and join us for our annual Psychic event. It is always well attended and provides a variety of opportunities for visitors to work with psychics and readers. Psychics were an important part of Victorian life and it is fitting that Kirkman House should host this kind of event. Victorian ladies would invite a psychic and a small circle of friends to drink tea, take refreshments and spend the afternoon or evening with a psychic who may have analyzed tarot cards, read palms, or conducted seances. Kirkman House's Psychic Fair will be held **Saturday November 5**. Individual readings will go from 10 until 4. The Whispered Memories group event will begin at 2:00 with Shirley Scott conducting the group session. Ms. Scott, who is an internationally known psychic, has been featured before at KHM. Reservations must be made for the group session and the cost is \$20 per person. Visitors can avail themselves of tarot card readers, crystal ball interpreters, mediums and palmistry experts in the individual sessions. Individual sessions do not require a reservation but are first-come first-served and the cost is \$25 per person.

Great Progress on Grants

Below is a picture of our President, Kent Settle, holding a \$100,000 check from the Sherwood Trust. This represents a huge step forward to funding the foundation and soffits restoration. Additionally we



recently received our ranking for a state grant for \$90,000 for the same project. In order to meet all of our matching requirements to begin spending these

funds we must raise an additional \$45,000 by next July. Please consider making a donation for this important restoration project.

Visitors can enjoy our festive decorations, look around the house, warm up with hot chocolate and then stroll downtown to the Parade of Lights.
